History

- June 2006 counter terrorism raids in the Greater Toronto Area resulted in the arrest of the "Toronto 18"
- A home-grown terrorist group planned a series of bomb attacks in Ontario
- Significant fear and social impact across the country
- A concerned group of Muslims living in Fredericton reached out to the Fredericton Police Force (FPF) to start a dialogue
- CDAC started in 2007



Mandate

- To advise the office of the Chief of Police on policing matters relating to cultural diversity, specifically:
- To provide input on police policy and programs related to cultural diversity in the workplace and the community;
- To identify and present issues of concern relative to inter-cultural relations, training, recruitment or other related matters;
- To collaboratively find solutions to issues of concern;
- Through sharing of experiences build, relationships between the Fredericton Police and the culturally diverse communities we serve.

Through the CDAC committee, we have engaged with the police on sensitive issues e.g. racism, discrimination and women rights. The CDAC committee has also become a place where different organizations working with newcomers including the police of Fredericton share experiences, challenges, and opportunities.

For people like me who are working in the integration and retention of newcomers in our city of Fredericton the collaboration of the police through the CDAC committee has helped me support newcomers and help them to avoid conflicting with the law. This has happened through offering language and cultural translation to newcomers as well as helping them to access to services offered by the police.

The CDAC is a committee to be preserved and thank you to the police and the City of Fredericton for creating it and for maintaining it.
